From the President

I took over from Ian Maclean as ALMA President in January this year after Ian stepped down for family reasons. I would like to pay tribute to Ian's many years of service to ALMA, and his outstanding dedication to the CAECC and the cause of Mandarin education in Australia. Ian's tireless leadership is in no small way responsible for the fact that ALMA is in excellent financial shape – a significant achievement for an organisation with a million-dollar turnover run largely by volunteers – and has such a high profile amongst the multicultural and education communities in Canberra. This not only enables us to keep our fees to a competitive level but also allows us to continue to promote Mandarin learning through the Centre and other ALMA activities. I wish Ian and his family all the very best and hope that we may welcome him back to the leadership of the association in future.

ALMA was pleased to host Senator the Hon Kate Lundy, Minister for Multicultural Affairs, at the Chinese Australian Early Childhood Centre in April. Senator Lundy was extremely supportive of the work we are doing in providing high-quality bilingual child care and clearly impressed with the contribution we are making to the Government's objectives in increasing Asia-literacy and Mandarin proficiency. She was also sympathetic to our arguments (put, so far unsuccessfully, to the ACT government) for an expansion of our Centre to separate our babies and toddlers, and thus enable us to take on more under-threes. This would help to alleviate the shortage in child care places for very young children and contribute further to laying the foundations of Mandarin proficiency in the next generation of Canberrans. We are continuing to pursue this with the ACT government, which owns the property that we operate from.

ALMA has also been hard at work with the Australian National University and the ACT Directorate of

Education and Training to organise a forum on Mandarin education in the ACT, scheduled for August 2013. We are hoping to bring together teachers, principals, academics, education administrators, parents and students, and anyone else with an interest in Chinese language education in the ACT to discuss how to improve the proficiency levels delivered by programs at all levels, from early childhood to tertiary. We are planning to hold a parents' seminar on Mandarin learning to get an idea of what parents would like from pre-school and school programs for their children prior to the forum to ensure that parents' views can be fed into the discussion.

I had the pleasure of meeting several CAECC parents at our working bee in March, and again when I indulged myself by accompanying the pre-schoolers on a very exciting excursion to the National Zoo and Aquarium earlier this month. I must say that both I and the Zoo staff were impressed by the excellent behaviour of our three- and four-year-olds, who were a credit to both their parents and our hard-working educators. I hope that others of you will be able to attend our parents' seminar on Mandarin learning, and my contact details are available at the Centre reception desk. I look forward to meeting more ALMA members in due course.

MAWSON PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

Mawson Primary School started the 2013 school year with two one day classes for students in Kindergarten to Year 1. The teachers for these classes were Jia Zhu on KMIP and a new teacher to our school, Constance Chen, on Y1 MIP. At the start of term 2 Constance moved to Perth to join her husband, who had taken up a work position there. Another new teacher to our school, Qinfei Celeste, commenced teaching the Yr1 MIP class in week 2.

The two day MIP classes have continued for year 3-6 students and the teachers are Cissy Lu 3/4MIP and Jia Zhu 5/6MIP. Cissy and Jia work closely with their English language teaching colleagues to cover the curriculum. All other students at our school have 1-1.5 hours of Mandarin each week in the languages other than English (LOTE) setting.

Three of our teachers. Lily Ang, Jia Zhu and Cissy Lu, are trialling the DRAFT Australian Language (Chinese) curriculum that is an excellent professional learning opportunity for them, as well as making a contribution at national level to the development of the final curriculum document.

The school hosted eleven students and two teachers, plus a tour coordinator, from two schools in Xi'an, China, for 5 days in February. They arrived on Friday 15 February and spent the weekend with their host families, including a visit to Tidbinbilla Nature reserve. The students then attended school until Wednesday 20 February, where they spent time in classes and undertook intensive English classes with teacher, Dawn-Maree Dunn. It was a very rewarding opportunity for the Mawson school community to be able to share our wonderful city and school with the visiting students and teachers.

Last Friday 31 May, Minister Joy Burch, MLA, was met by several students from KMIP and 5/6MIP, who welcomed her to the school in English and Mandarin. Four students from 3/5MIP told Minister Burch the reasons why they were studying Mandarin language.

CHINESE PAINTING CLASS

Learn how to paint a range of popular subjects using Traditional & Contemporary Chinese Brush Painting techniques. Projects gradually increase in difficulty, and feature such subjects as bamboo, wild orchids, roses, peonies, pandas, cats and more.

Short course

Duration : Two sessions, 3 hours per session in two different days.

Time: 9:30am-12:30pm, Saturdays.

Cost : \$150 (material included)

Venue: Art studio, 11a Beauchamp Street Deakin ACT Australia

This short course is for those who are new to the traditional Chinese brush painting.

The course starts with demonstration and detailed explanation of basic brush strokes of the free style Chinese painting. We then start to experiment techniques of using water, ink and colours on rice paper to draw plants and birds. At the end of this course, students will be able to produce their own pieces of creation.

Weekly Course

Duration : 2 hours per session per week.

Time: 6:30-8:30pm, Wednesdays

Cost : \$35 per session

Venue: The Artists Shed, 14 Foster Street, Queanbeyan NSW Australia

This course is for those who are more serious about learning traditional Chinese brush painting step by step and to develop their free style skills continuously.

Chinese language and calligraphy as cultural background will be taught in the class for building up a strong foundation.

Flowers, plants, animals such as birds and rocks are the topics to cover. Every lesson will start with a language lesson and a demonstration of the object that the students are learning, followed by students' own practise. Students are encouraged to practise the new skills at home, and to bring their work in for teacher's comment in the following lesson.

Do Chinese dialects have a future?

The standardization of Mandarin and its promotion and enforcement as the national language has done much to break down language barriers within the PRC. In addition, the use of Pǔtōnghuà as a lingua franca has greatly helped China’s economic and social development. But this has come at a cost to various dialects, which are arguably an integral part of each region’s habits, culture, and unique characteristics.
