The 25th anniversary celebrations of the Chinese-Australian Early Childhood Centre in November 2009 were a great success and a major milestone for our Association.

We were pleased to have as guests Minister-Counsellor WANG Yongda, representing the Chinese Ambassador; Mr ZHANG Jide, Second Secretary, Education Office, Embassy of the People's Republic of China; Mr Steve Doszpot, Member of the ACT Legislative Assembly; Mr Nic Manikis, Director of the ACT Office of Multicultural, Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Affairs; Ms Amanda Andrews, Principal, Mawson Primary School; and members of the Board of the School.

It was a magnificent occasion. I am sure everyone was impressed with the enthusiasm and facility with Mandarin which our very young children displayed. A very big thank you to Judy and her staff for their dedication and commitment to putting on such a wonderful concert.

ALMA is continuing to negotiate with the University of Canberra about establishing a second childcare centre to service the north of Canberra, on the university campus at Bruce. ALMA provided a business plan for the proposed centre to the University in December. The plan allowed for 70 places, and was weighted towards the under three age group, as that is where the greatest demand for childcare in Canberra appears to be. Negotiations based on this plan will take place early in the New Year.

At its meeting in December, the ALMA Committee agreed some ground rules for the financial arrangements between the two centres, should the UC childcare centre come into existence. In short, they are to be financially separate, but both will operate with ALMA as operator, i.e. holder of the licence to operate the childcare centre.

CHINESE NEW YEAR

In 2010, Chinese New Year begins on Sunday February 14.

Chinese New Year is also called Lunar New or the Spring Festival 春节 (chunjie). It is the most important of the traditional Chinese holidays. The festival traditionally begins on the first day of the first month 正月 (zhēng yuè) in the Chinese calendar and ends 15 days later with the Lantern Festival 元宵 (Yuan-Xiao).

This year will be the year of the Tiger 虎 (hu). Since it is a twelve year cycle, previous tiger years were 1950, 1962, 1974, 1986 and 1998.

Chinese Australian
Early Childhood
Centre (CAECC)

澳华幼儿中心新闻

The following short report on the centre's bilingual program was provided by by Ling Lin, the assistant in the preschool room.

Language development is extremely rapid during early childhood. Children's vocabulary increases very quickly so by age 6 they can communicate well with adults. Children learn language through listening and speaking, which provides the possibility of learning a second language in an environment like the CAECC where the children hear and use Chinese as part of their daily life.

Most children arrive at the centre at 8:00am and stay until 6:00pm. There is always one native Chinese speaker and one native English speaker so children can learn from both teachers. Children learn as native speakers would, as part of their everyday experience rather than in a formal lesson.

For example, when the children arrive at the start of the day, the Chinese teacher will welcome them with 早上好 zao shang hao 'Good morning'. After a few days the children will begin to understand and copy this greeting.

All activities are accompanied by the English and Chinese phrases. In this way children associate the activity with the phrase. E.g. hand washing time would be described in Chinese as 请洗手(ging xi shou).

Children learn more during Chinese lesson time. For example, children will learn the Chinese names for different parts of the body by drawing, cutting out pictures, and saying the words after the teacher.

Songs are also used, for example the English and Chinese version of 'head, shoulders, knees and toes"头发,肩膀,膝盖,脚 (tou fa, jian bang, xi gai, jiao). Children learn quickly in this fun way.

Some of the common English and Chinese phrases and activities used at the centre are listed in the attachment to this newsletter.

Note from the Director:

Our centre is currently operating at close to full capacity but has a few places for over 3 year-olds on Mondays and Fridays.
